



TAKING CARE OF YOUR DEVICES

KEY STANDARDS

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students will....

- Understand how important it is to care for the devices they use.
- Learn three tips that will help them care for their devices.
- Practice recalling the tips they learn.



VOCABULARY

ENTRUST: To put something into someone's care or protection.

DEVICE: A piece of equipment or technology, like a computer, laptop, tablet, cellphone, gaming console, and more.

DATA: Another word for information.

THE LESSON

1. Remind students that in an earlier lesson they learned about the value of responsibility. Review what they learned. Introduce and have students record the vocabulary words above too.
2. Explain that being entrusted with a device—this includes computers, laptops, tablets, gaming devices, and more—is a *huge* responsibility. That's because these devices can be expensive and are often delicate and breakable!

THE LESSON, continued

3. Screen the video, then discuss the key points:
 - There are three basic tips that can help us care for our devices responsibly.
 - **Tip #1: Handle them with care.** Since devices can break it is important to think about how we transport them and where we set them down or leave them. Exposing them to extreme temperatures or direct sunlight can damage them or make them temporarily unusable. It is also important to remember to plug them in at night in order to charge them up!
 - **Tip #2: Keep them clean.** We should always be sure our hands are clean and dry before using a device. Most devices are not waterproof, so if we want to clean them we should use a clean dry cloth. It's wise to keep food and drinks away from devices too. Crumbs can damage a keyboard.
 - **Tip #3: Keep them safe.** It's important to keep track of our devices, because they can be costly to replace, and our data is on them. We shouldn't leave them somewhere where they could easily disappear, get stolen, or where we might forget about them. When we finish using a device, we should remember to log out, so no one else can access our information.
4. Finally, explain that if something breaks, gets stolen, or goes wrong, they should tell a parent or a teacher immediately.

ACTIVITY

Tell students they are about to “fill in the blanks” by recalling the information they just learned. When they are done, review and discuss their answers (your key is on the last page).
